



## Endowment Challenge... We did it!

The recent history of the WEH Boys & Girls Club has been filled with exciting changes and dynamic growth. The new Lewis and Gordon Clubhouse, made possible by the generous donations of Henry Lewis, Alan Lewis, and James Gordon, stands proudly on Allston Street and its bright and cheery façade welcomes young people each day. New programs abound in this facility as youth are exposed to community service, educational programs, digital arts, ballet, theater, visual arts, athletics, and much more. As the board of directors plans ahead, the future looks bright.

The success of the recent Endowment Campaign is part of the reason for this

confidence. In 2003, an anonymous foundation promised a contribution of \$750,000 to our endowment if WEH Boys & Girls Club leadership could raise \$1.5 million. Led by an ambitious board of directors, this task has been completed and the WEH Boys & Girls Club endowment now has an additional \$2.25 million.

Alan Lewis led the charge with a gift of \$900,000, the largest received in the endowment campaign. Long-time Club supporter Jack Hornstein, who just celebrated his 95th birthday, came through before the challenge deadline with a gift of \$18,000 to close the gap and meet the goal. As Board President Charles Rodgers noted, "The success

of this campaign is only the most recent indication of the tremendous vitality of this unique institution and its increasingly broad base of support in the community."

If you looked into the windows of the Clubhouse on Saturday January 21, you would have seen an unusual sight. Teenagers and senior citizens were spending the day together, playing cards, participating in workshops, having lunch, and just enjoying each other's company.

It was the first "Service Saturday," coordinated by the ten teenagers who are this year's Brian Honan Fellows. During this event, Honan fellows listened and

conversed with seniors as information was shared about community activism and how to make Allston-Brighton a better place for the elderly and families. Eighteen year-old Leo Law spent the service Saturday with an elderly couple who spoke Mandarin. Senior Center staff member Millie McLaughlin remarked at how rare and gratifying it was for them to be able to speak their native tongue.

The members of the Brian Honan Fellowship, age 14-18, have formed a tight-knit group. Their mission? To learn about and promote civic engagement, to plan and implement Club and community service activities, and to lead and influence change in their neighborhood. Fellowship Coordinator and Club staff Kristin Pineo remarked, "They are a dynamic group, filled with humor and a desire to bring about positive changes in their own backyard."

# Board Profile: Pramila Vivek

“The West End House is a place for children seeking a safe, loving, nurturing and fun-filled environment under the caring eyes of a committed and dedicated staff,” says Pramila Vivek, West End House’s newest member of the Board of Directors.

Vivek’s involvement with WEH began when her son, Siddhartha, was a club member. A resident of the Allston-Brighton area for 26 years, Vivek has seen first hand how West End House impacts community youth.

Currently working at Harvard Medical School, Vivek has been with Harvard

University for 25 years. In 1992, she co-founded the International Health Organization, a nonprofit group dedicated to improving the standards and quality of life for the disadvantaged people of South Asia. She strongly feels that improved health for people in developing countries is a prerequisite for economic and social development.

When Pramila Vivek came to this country in the early 1970s, she had already earned a Master’s Degree in Comparative Literature and taught college for a year in her native India. She also has a graduate degree in Educational Policy and Curriculum

Development from the University of Wisconsin, and, as she puts it, “twenty years and two sons later, I obtained an MPH from the Harvard School of Public Health.” As time permits, she performs Indian classical music, and loves to cook, knit, and read.

Pramila’s passion will always be bringing resources to those who need it most. She says, “I will continue as long as possible to work in health and development programs that benefit the poorest people.” The WEH Boys & Girls Club is fortunate to have Pramila as a new member of the team!
