They continue their father's philosophy of supporting the "underdog" by giving to an organization that helps kids who often fall through the cracks. Jim Gordon honors his late brother Michael, an Allston businessman, who generously supported the community. Jim's philanthropic commitment to the Club is a tribute to the memory of his brother.

Each year, Alan, Henry and Jim honor Edward Lewis and Michael Gordon at an annual dinner. Under the sparkling chandeliers of the Grand Ball Room at the Fairmont Copley Plaza Hotel,

guests socialize with friends, enjoy fine dining, and dance to live music. Annual proceeds from the event support the Lewis and Gordon Center of the West End House Boys & Girls Club, the recently renovated facility for children and teens in Allston-Brighton.

Summer at the West End House Boys & Girls Club *Around the World in 44 Days*

More than two hundred young people participated in the Club's Summer Program this year. Titled "Around the World in 44 Days", it offered nine weeks of new experiences, new ideas, learning, and fun. The "Around the World" theme was chosen so participating youth could learn about a variety of cultures, traditions, and value systems from across the globe.

The summer program began bright and early each day at 8:30 AM when children and teens arrived at the Club for

breakfast. The days unfolded with art and dance classes, swimming lessons, technology programs, gym activities, and other recreational games. Club staff agreed that the field trips were a key part of the summer program and this year's destinations included Mt. Monadnock, Nahant Beach, and Georges Island.

Education was a priority, even in the summertime. Every child spent at least one hour each day in the Education Center working on different themed projects. While learning about Africa, children made Egyptian pyramids out of sugar cubes and studied engineering. Projects on the rainforest and the Bill of Rights also engaged young people.

Kids Café Coordinator Mary Bot served lunch daily and featured meals from different cultures each Wednesday. These international menus included plantains with chicken and rice from the Dominican Republic, Ethiopian Flat

bread, and Portuguese beef and tomatoes.

The program ended each day at 5:30 PM when parents picked up their children and teens from the Club. Three evenings per week, the Club stayed open until 9:00 PM for teenagers to experience cooking class, digital music, college preparation, field trips and more. Many of these teens also worked as Junior Staff in the day program and therefore experienced the satisfaction of their first paycheck. For all youth involved, the Club offered an engaging and fun way to spend the summer months.

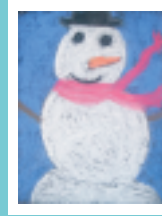
Toy and Gift Donations
